In the Scriptures, we see that salvation by God's free and sovereign grace based on the glorious Person and finished work of Christ as the Surety, Substitute, Redeemer, Life-giver, and Preserver of God's elect is an all-glorious and all-encompassing truth. It spans both eternity and time where what God has purposed, decreed, and declared in His eternal mind, is worked out and accomplished in time as He "worketh all things after the counsel of His own will" (Ephesians 1:11). We see then that ALL THINGS IN ETERNITY AND TIME are founded upon, revolve around, and lead to the glory of God in and by the Lord Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. The cross of Christ is the crux of all eternity and time. And what God has accomplished in time did not change His eternal mind. The cross of Christ did not change God's mind towards the people He chose in Christ before the foundation of the world. The cross of Christ revealed what God's mind always was and always will be towards His elect. "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by Whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world" (Galatians 6:14).

There is Power in the Blood of Christ!

We know the value and the power of Christ's blood (His death for the sins of God's elect imputed to Him) from the credit it had for the putting away and the cleansing of the guilt and the establishment of righteousness for God's elect, before it was actually shed in time. We know it also from the God-given faith and the reliance that true believers had on it in all ages, Old and New Testament. The blood of Christ was applied from the foundation of the world, though it was not shed till the fullness of time. The Old Testament saints had the benefit of the promise of redemption before the accomplishment of the sacrifice of Christ for redemption. The cleansing we have now is upon the account of the blood of Christ already shed. The cleansing the Old Testament believers had then was upon the account of the blood of Christ in time to be shed: the one respects it as past, the other as future. We must distinguish the virtue from the work of redemption. The work was appointed in a certain time, but the virtue was not restrained to a certain time, but was communicated to believers from the foundation of the world, as well as extended to the last ages of the world. This fact alone shows the necessity of Christ coming in time to fulfill all righteousness for His people, and the true power and value of His blood as the payment for all the sins of all of God's people (*Gal. 4:4-6; Heb. 2:14-17*).

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
