

BETHEL'S THIRD ANNUAL STRONGSVILLE CITY JAZZ SWING BAND CONCERT TO BENEFIT THE MIDDLEBURG EARLY EDUCATION

SUNDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 22, 2017, 3:00 p.m. The Strongsville City Jazz Swing Band is one of the most versatile big bands in the Cleveland area, playing everything from jazz classics to swing music from the big band era. The fine musicians who make up the band bring a variety of musical experience to their performances that include entertaining at Playhouse Square, The Front Row Theater, Kenley Players, and The Coliseum. Some members of the band have performed with some well-known ensembles, including The Glenn Miller Orchestra, Warren Covington, Buddy Rich, Louie Bellson, Jimmy Dorsey big bands, and the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. The band performs during the summer as part of the Strongsville Community Band Summer Concerts and in other area communities. During the winter the band has been featured at a number of Cleveland area high school jazz festivals and will, on occasion, play for some dances.

The Strongsville City Jazz is co-directed by Ken Mehalko and James Wonnacott. Ken founded the band in 1992. He is retired from the Strongsville City Schools where he successfully directed the high school band for 29 years. Presently he directs the Strongsville Community Band, and is the former Director of Athletic Bands at Baldwin Wallace College.

James Wonnacott is also a graduate of Baldwin-Wallace. He retired from the Strongsville City Schools in 1996 where he had success teaching at Center Junior High School. He has performed with the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra and has toured with singer, Al Martino. On June 27, 2011 Jim performed with the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra at Lake Chautauqua, New York. From July 13-15, 2016 he performed with THE PLATTERS playing five shows over the three days. He is



the founder and former Musical Director of the Baldwin-Wallace College (now University) Alumni Jazz Orchestra. Awards include the 2009 B-W Conservatory Alumni Achievement Award, the B-W Alumni Association Merit Award, and inclusion in the Euclid High School Alumni Association Distinguished Alumni Achievement Hall of Fame. Currently he is the Music Director of the Cleveland TOPS Swingband.

Vocalist Cindy Smith complements the band with her refreshing vocal renditions of many pop favorites.

These musicians donate their time and talent and love to come to Bethel to play in our acoustically live space. All proceeds from a free-will offering will go to Middleburg Early Education Center's "Marilyn Edwards Scholarship Fund". REPORT FROM PARKING LOT AD HOC COMMITTEE

As reported earlier, the need to address the condition of our parking lot was identified by the congregation council at the end of 2016. Since January, an ad hoc committee has been meeting regularly to analyze the condition of our parking lot and to research possible solutions for re-

building/replacing it. The committee members are: Bob Kuder, chair, Mitch Ciccarello, Bob Minut, Ed Harbart, Bradshaw Rescola and Granger Krebill. Over eleven meetings, several factors were discussed related to this project. After interviewing eight different contractors who gave the committee many different ideas to provide solutions to improve the parking lot and solve some of the problems we now face, the committee developed a Request for Quote that would put all the contractors on an apples to apples comparison so we could compare the quotes. Of the eight contractors that we started with only four were chosen to quote. The committee is currently examining the quotes. More information, including a final proposal for completing and funding this project will be presented at the annual meeting in November. We hope to be able to complete this project next spring. ANNUAL MEETING SCHEDULED FOR NOVEMBER 19, 2017.

This year our Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, **November 19, 2017, immediately following worship at 9:45 AM.** The agenda for the annual meeting includes ministry and staff reports, the election of council and other ministry members, and the presentation of the 2018 budget for congregational approval. Also on the agenda will be a proposal for a plan to replace

our parking lot next spring. (See separate article about parking lot.) Copies of the Annual Report, including the proposed budget will be available in the Gathering Place or in the church office on November 12, one week before the meeting, so that you may have a chance to look over the reports and figures before the meeting. Several ministry leadership positions are up for election this year. Transformed by Grace, Faith and Love



The theme for this year's stewardship emphasis is *Transformed by Grace, Faith, and Love.* We will begin this emphasis on Sunday, October 8, 2017. As God's people, we have been given the high honor of being his stewards. As his stewards, we are called to manage faithfully all that we've been entrusted with according to God's will and benefit. Because of God's generous gifts of grace, faith, and love, we can accomplish all that God asks us to do. God works in and through us as we become his hands, feet, and mouth. Each week during this three-week emphasis, we will be focusing on one of the three virtues, grace, faith, and love.

In week one, our focus is on God's undeserved kindness and love which the Bible calls grace. God's grace comes from God through Jesus and his work for us. It is not something we have a right to. Jesus obtained it for us. We get it freely because of the obedience and sacrifice of Jesus. This saving grace also enables and motivates us to be God's stewards. The power of God's grace in our lives compels us to use our time, talents, and money in ways that glorify God.

In week two, we are reminded that it is through faith that we have access into God's grace and a new relationship with him. Through faith, God changes us, and we are born anew of him. Not only does faith justify us and give us peace with God (Romans 5:1), we are told by James and other writers that faith produces works (James 2:18). Faith leads to action. Through faith, we are empowered to fulfill God's purposes. Our deeds as stewards are evidence of our faith.

The third week we will focus on the virtue of love. Love ought to follow faith. Love seeks the welfare of others. "Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us" (1 John 4:11-12). God's love in Christ will compel us to do things that appear foolish to unbelievers. God's love prompts us to give freely of our time, talents, and treasures to help others and extend his kingdom.

I hope and pray that God will use the messages on *Transformed by Grace, Faith, and Love* to draw you closer to him. I also urge you to make every effort to attend worship as we focus on grace, faith, and love.

Baptismal Promise Honored in All Saints Celebration

A message from Vicar Christy...

Despite growing up in a Lutheran church, I was not baptized as an infant, but at the age of 13 due to church's polity issues surrounding my mother not being a member of the church, and her desire to stand up for me at my baptism. Because of my age, I remember my baptism well. I was so nervous and excited. I had just completed studying the sacrament of baptism in my catechism class and was excited that I would join the ranks of those who were baptized believers. I did not know what was going to happen during the baptism besides the fact there would be water placed on my head and a sign of the cross marked on my forehead.



Looking back, I don't remember feeling different. I don't remember anything about me changing on the outside, but on the inside, I knew without a doubt that I was God's and one day I would meet God in heaven. I was now *claimed* by God, I was fully and truly a child of God. My parents promised to bring me to church and to help me continue to grow in my faith, my paternal grandmother was one of my sponsors, a role she took seriously. A year later, I made my affirmation of baptism and joined the church as a member in my own right.

As the students at Bethel approach their affirmation of baptism, I think it is important for us all to examine our own baptismal promises and what it means for our own lives. For me, my baptismal promise means that I rely on God to be in charge and not myself. It means that I will forever be a student, learning and growing in my faith. One's faith does not stop needing nurtured just because we are confirmed, it means that we are now responsible for nurturing it, not our parents, not our friends – we are. It means that I am called to shine the light of Christ into the world, being the vehicle in which Christ is revealed to others. It means that I have an obligation to God and my neighbor to care for all of creation and act in a loving and gracious manner that reflects the promises I made and the promise God makes through Christ; promises that are the bedrock of my faith.

Baptism into Christ's death and resurrection, assures us the promise of resurrection hope. Living in Christ we have the promise of never being forsaken despite our sin. We are given a glimpse into the Kingdom of Heaven and the divine creator who loves us unceasingly. When we are baptized, we become a part of Christ's church, the universal church where Christ is the head; we are given a family that is bigger than our wildest imaginations. Baptism makes us a communion of saints past and present. We are reminded of this each week during the prayers of intercession as we thank God for all who have come before us in faith, guiding us and helping us to know God in new ways. This holy bond is unbreakable. It is this bond we celebrate on All Saints Day.

I invite you to join together on Sunday, November 5, 2017, as we witness and celebrate the sacrament of Holy Baptism of two of God's children, welcome new adult members who are living into their baptismal promises, using the same rite that our young people will have and undergone the week before, as well as, honoring the saints who have gone before us in this pilgrimage of faith. I cannot imagine a more profound way to celebrate this day than with those God has called to the fount and commemorating those who have joined the church triumphant, claiming the promise that God made at their own baptism.

Vicar Christy Krnac Taking Internship to New Levels

Bethel's internship committee, formed in June, is helping Vicar Christy Krnac to become an excellent ELCA pastor. In monthly meetings, the committee reviews Christy's performance and assists her in achieving the goals in her learning-serving covenant: leadership, leading worship, preaching, teaching, evangelism, pastoral care, social ministry, stewardship, and ecumenism.



Christy's internship calls for her service to God, the ELCA, our congregation, and the community. In a unique, first-time ever ministry for Bethel Lutheran, Christy extends Christian care to strangers and friends beyond our church. She does this in a "Coffee and Prayer" time, on Wednesdays, from 10:00 am until noon, with folks at the Middleburg Heights Panera. She is doing this ministry weekly. More events to come!

This "Coffee and Prayer" event is known as a "Third Space" ministry held in a public-community area (such as coffee shops, malls, and gyms). The first two spaces are "Domestic Space" (our homes) and "Civic Space" (schools and work). Why a "Third Space," when, in a sense, a church is a "Third Space?" It is because through this ministry, it is easier and more practical to meet new people and build relationships, going out and loving people, knowing some of these relationships will bear Gospel fruit.

At Vacation Bible School, Christy found that working with kids and adults was an enjoyable "controlled chaos." However, she notes that the experience will help her to better understand youth and adults in future gatherings. Christy also says that she valued touring Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry with Ed Harbart.

Future activities include preparing Stewardship Temple Talks, preparing for next year's Lenten Sermon series, and continuing "Coffee and Prayer" times. Vicar Christy is currently leading the Reformation Roots adult study and has joined the choir.
