Dear Friends in Christ,

As I've mentioned in worship recently, 1 Thessalonians is almost certainly the youngest "book" (it's actually a *letter*) of the New Testament, and that, as such, its contents heavily reflect the earliest church's concern—and assumption—regarding the imminent Second Coming of Christ. According to the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, even *Jesus* assumed that His coming would be within the mortal lifetimes of some of the people listening to Him talk about it (Mt. 16:27-28, Luke 9:26-27)! The fact that even Jesus was wrong is the best illustration I can think of for something else He said regarding the Second Coming: "...about that day or hour, *no one knows*, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." (Mark 13:32). I would further suggest to you that this, along with the frequent warnings to be ready for it, are the *only* statements in the Bible regarding the Second Coming that we need to pay strict attention to. As I say that, keep in mind that it's nothing short of amazing how much of the New Testament is occupied with content about this event—it was a big, big deal! Various NT writers give their take on the details of what to expect, details that often don't match up well with one another; because of that, I would strongly advise my fellow Christians not to invest much—if any—time and energy on the endless speculating that has gone on from one generation to another about what all these details might mean for the present day or the near-future.

I personally *love* the Books of Daniel and Revelation; I've studied them much and taught classes on them often, and I can tell you with complete confidence that there is very little in them that cannot be understood by learning *why* they were written and *to whom*. And, it's precisely in knowing as much as possible about *those* things that will give us a powerful and enduring message for the present day – a message much clearer and substantial than any amount of guesswork about the future could ever provide!

Jesus made it clear to us how to be ready to meet Him, whenever and however it happens: live one day at a time in the way God wants us to live—something relatively easy to *understand*, but devilishly difficult to *do*. I use that word "devilishly" quite intentionally. C.S. Lewis wrote a book called "The Screwtape Letters", in which he presents the work of temptation from the devil's and demons' point of view. At one point the demon Screwtape counsels his protégé, Wormwood, to be patient with his "patient", saying that "(We) have time itself as our ally...you see, it is so hard for these creatures (human beings) to *persevere...*"

Besides being a season of preparation for *Christmas*, Advent is not unlike the season of Lent; that is, it is set aside as a time for spiritual renewal and strengthening, a time for helping ourselves and each other "persevere" in our distinctively Christian living. *Lent* helps us prepare to most properly experience the joy of Easter; *Advent* helps us to most properly experience the joy of either Christmas, or Christ's Second Coming—whichever comes first. Come, Lord Jesus!

Yours in Christ, Pastor Pete May God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through. May your whole spirit, soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.


