Dear Friends and Members of BCUMC

I want to share my experience of Sierra Service Project with our youth group to Vernonia in Oregon from March 19 to 24. When I said I would join our youth group for SSP, I was told, "You are crazy!" "You are out of mind!" "Do you know what you are getting into?" I guess I didn't know exactly what I was getting into. But now I know!

When I came back, one member asked me "Was it worth going there?" My answer was "Yes! It was definitely worth going there." I learned a lot. I learned that SSP is a really *SERIOUS* Service Project. The

work itself involved only two days. But after two days, most of us had muscle aches all over our bodies. 24 of us were divided into four teams with four different tasks: landscaping, gardening, planting trees, and a flooring job at a house.

Cheryl Breitenbucher and I had the four youngest members of the youth group in our team. We went to a house owned by an elderly couple. Our job was to take off the old flooring and to install a new one. It sounded easy at first. But the thing was that the 50-year-old vinyl flooring would not easily come off. The black gluing stuff was so hard like rocks. We sweated a lot and labored hard. We used hammers, chisels, knives.... I was so worried about the safety for the kids. But no one was hurt. We could finish the job on the second day.

Our kids were so impressive. The hardest thing for me was the smell of the house and the dust generated constantly. The cat litter box in the house seemed never cleaned up. The smell and the dusty air were unbearable. But our four kids had never complained about anything.





For two days, we had water breaks from time to time outside the house. Whenever Cheryl and I were about to enjoy the fresh air outside, the kids finished drinking the cup so quickly and "BAM" disappeared into the house. They were so focused and so driven to finish their job. I've never seen kids like them before. Ordinary kids would start complaining after 5 to 10 minutes of such hard work. Then you have to convince them to change their minds. Often times, therefore, it is easier for us to do the work by ourselves without kids' help.

But our kids were not like that. They were not only focused and driven but also non-judgmental and respectful toward the homeowners. They soon became my inspiration throughout those two days. Their attitude inspired not only me but also the homeowners. On the first day they paid almost zero attention to our presence. But on the second day, they got out of their sofa and bed and started picking up garbage. They had smiles on their faces. And they thanked us, saying "You guys are doing a great job. Thank you very much!" It made our days so worthwhile and rewarding.

And I wondered who were responsible for helping our kids to grow into such humble Christ-like servants. They drove 10 hours, total 673 miles to get there and offered 10 hours of service without expecting anything in return to those whom they had never met before.

You may think that parents made them do it. Maybe true to some! But what I had witnessed with my own eyes was not backing up that answer. I asked some kids who had come this year the third time, "Why did you come back?" They said, "Because it is fun!" I could tell it was a sincere answer.

I am not saying that they are perfect kids. I've seen enough that they were perfectly teenagers. They did all kinds of things that typical teenagers usually do. Believe me! I have seen so many frustrating battles going on between the counselors and the kids. These were all behind scenes / stories hidden under the beautiful Facebook pictures.

But they were different in many ways having shown Christ-like characters. I think Sierra Service Project has impacted on their character. I think Service-oriented youth ministry has slowly transformed their hearts and minds.

On the trip we had six youth leaders who constantly showed God's unconditional love through their loving care and coaching. I witnessed throughout this trip how dedicated they are, how united they are, and how skillful they are in teaching the kids with the examples of Christ. Their leadership and shepherding have produced such strong Christian youth members who understand true meaning of service found in the life of Jesus Christ.

I am so grateful for what I have witnessed during this trip! I've seen so much bright light and hope for the future of our church and for the next generation Christian community! Thanks be to God!



#### SIERRA SERVICE PROJECT EXCURSION

Seventeen kids, seven adults, two vans, one trailer, and a whole lot of luggage headed north to Oregon for an incredible time. We met at the church at 5:30am on Thursday, March 19th. The drive was lengthy, but we had food stops in Dunsmuir at a beautiful park overlooking the river and at Dorris Ranch, which was closed, but we wandered the grounds anyway. We arrived at our hotel in Klackamas



where we had a late dinner, then headed off to our rooms, grateful to be out of the vans. The next morning, we woke up to a gray sky and headed to a very trendy music store that had loads of CDs, records, and obscure gifts. We had time to shop for about an hour, and then headed to Powell's Books, which is an extremely large bookstore. You could spend an entire day there, but we only had an hour.

We walked a few blocks to Right to Dream Too (R2D2), a homeless tent community. It's a place that offers shelter (sleep) for 12 hours. A tour was guided by someone who works and lives there. They rent the land for \$1 a year, and we learned about the struggles they have endured in trying to keep the place going. Their largest bills are the porta pottys and the cleaning for the bedding. Afterwards, we waited in line to get VooDoo Doughnuts, which are super unique doughnuts with fun flavors. We crossed the border into Washington (for those who had never been in Washington), ate lunch at a park and went back into Oregon. We visited another community called Dignity Village, a city-recognized encampment of around 60 people in Portland. There are about 40 10x15 foot shelters. The people who live there must work within the community; all must take shifts at the security desk, and they run small businesses to be sustainable. We brought doughnuts to the village and chatted with folks before taking a tour of the grounds. This was a great opportunity to see two very different homeless communities that even differed greatly from the shelter at Skid Row in Los Angeles that we toured last year.

Friday evening we arrived in Vernonia, where we unloaded the vans and trailer, met the awesome SSP staff (Becca and Cate), and got settled. We had a great dinner made by community members and learned about our group projects. Julius, David, Kellen, Hannah, Alyssa, and Aidan worked at the school, which had been recently built because all of the schools had been so severely damaged from the flood that there was only the shell of their gym left. The school was moved up on a hill. This group planted trees, flowers, weeded, and worked a lot with the new community garden that the entire town will be working on and fitting into their school curriculum.

Rick, Becca, Hunter, Justine, Wren, and Griffin did some beautification at the Pioneer Museum. They weeded a lot and cleared debris, removed old concrete bits, de-mossed sidewalks and a porch area, and dug a ditch for piping for water diversion. Paul, Jen, Kiala, Emma, Jamie, and Sam recovered a handicap ramp, cleared debris from the parking lot, scraped a lot of moss, and stripped many layers of aging paint from the ramp railing so that it would be ready for a new paint job by community members at the museum. Hyesung, Cheryl, Jaylynn, Murphy, Alex, and Isaac worked in a community member's home, stripping old linoleum from a small hallway and bathroom. We then cut and placed the new flooring with a new diamond pattern that was at times challenging, to fit just so.

Saturday evening we had a wonderful program, where community members Patty and Penny came and talked to us about their experiences when the flood occurred. Although the last flood happened in 2007, they are still doing a lot of rebuilding not just in the town, but also in their hearts. Sunday morning, we headed back to our work sites, and finished our tasks. Afterward we drove to Tillamook, where we toured the cheese factory and tasted the delicious samples (twice). We also indulged in the delicious ice cream. We then headed to Tillamook UMC, where we spent the night and had a Pajama Service. It was quite meaningful and special, because the youth leaders washed the kids feet, just as Jesus washed the feet of the disciples.



Monday morning we drove to the Cape Meares lighthouse and saw the beautiful Oregon coast. We drove to Salem, and stopped at Bush's Pasture Park where there are signs warning of an attack owl, "Owl Capone". We ate lunch quickly, but got chased away by rain (not the owl). We trekked to Ashland, and were thankful for the indoor pool and hot tub. Tuesday morning we wandered the streets of quaint Ashland and had a restaurant meal before seeing Guys & Dolls at the Shakespeare Festival. The show was incredible. We

finally drove home after an exhausting and fulfilling trip, arriving back to the church at 11:15pm.

What a wonderful opportunity for our youth to experience. We served, worked and played together, and had several learning opportunities throughout our trip. A huge thank you to everyone who made this trip possible. We know that we could not have this trip without your generous support and prayers.

Cheryl Dobson will be in Gabon, West Africa from April 6-17, working as a representative from Project HOPE and in concert with the U.S. Navy. She will be working at a hospital in Port Gentil to improve capacity of the healthcare system by providing what the Navy calls Subject Matter Expert Exchange (SMEE). This mission involves interacting with local healthcare professionals, going on rounds, and providing teaching relevant to their needs and wants. We gear the education to helping them implement evidenced-based practice using the resources they have available. The hope is that care will be improved while respecting the limitations of the resourcepoor setting.

Cheryl says the work she does rejuvenates her and makes her appreciate the bounty that we enjoy here. God bless our BCUMC member for devoting her time to help others.

We had a lively discussion of the book and the author's perspective of how humanitarian aid is given after disasters. This book was part of the UMW Reading Program.

Starting in June, Jenn Dunn will be leading a book discussion in a "Walk and Talk" Format. Once each month from June to September we will meet at Round Valley Regional Park (off Marsh Creek Road) to discuss the book Americanah by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie--Random House (2014). Here is a Brief Description of the book:

Ifemelu reluctantly left Nigeria on a college scholarship and seems to have everything a Nigerian immigrant in America could desire. But culture shock, hardships and racism have left her feeling like she has "cement in her soul." Astonished at the labyrinth of racial structures that confront her, Ifemelu launches an audacious and instantly popular blog that explores what she calls Racial Disorder Syndrome. May contain provocative language and content.

### ENDOWMENT FUND

A number of years ago an Endowment Committee was formed. The committee met with an advisor from the California-Nevada United Methodist Foundation and developed plans to create an Endowment Fund for our church. The Endowment Fund for BCUMC was established about five years ago, but few people know about the fund. The concept behind an endowment fund is quite simple. Members and friends of the church donate money to the Endowment Fund and people at the Conference who know about money matters then manage the money. The money deposited in the Endowment Fund is never spent. It does, however, earn interest. The earned interest could be available to support special projects for the church. Interest from endowment funds provides large organizations like the symphony or ballet with a good chunk of their budgets. Our Endowment Fund is small and the interest earned currently is simply reinvested.

Donations to endowment funds can be cash donations at any time. However, many endowment funds receive donations from estates because people named the fund in their wills, trusts, insurance policies, and financial and retirement accounts.

The Endowment Committee will host Susan Peters, a representative of the California-Nevada United Methodist Foundation after church on May 3. Her presentation will describe how donations to the Endowment Fund can be advantageous to both the church and the donor.
