Being a Matthew 25 Church

Acts 2:17 "I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh"

Park Presbyterian Church is a Matthew 25 Church. There are three foci for a Matthew 25 Church: Building Congregational Vitality; Dismantling Structural Racism; Eradicating Systemic Poverty.

During the Month of July, I will be focusing on Building Congregational Vitality. What is Congregational vitality?

In an article from the PCUSA website, it said:

“You might think that the vitality of a congregation or worshipping community is based on the number of members, the scope of programs, the size of financial gifts or some other statistics. Not so—at least not entirely. Rather, a community’s vitality is primarily its spiritual strength and its capacity for purposeful mission. Congregational vitality is evident in a worshipping community when its structural systems, finances, and discipleship practices are aligned in such a way that the community is actively engaged in the mission of God in their local community and the world, and they are powerfully focused on growing as disciples in the way of Jesus Christ. Faith comes alive when we boldly engage God’s mission and share the hope we have in Christ.”

Starting on June 26, I will be addressing the seven marks of vital congregations. Being a vital congregation fits nicely with interim ministry. Each week I will address a different mark:

June 26: Caring Relationships

July 3: Life-Long Discipleship Formation

July 10: Outward Incarnational Focus (Who is our Neighbor?)

July 17: Empower Servant Leadership (Spiritual Styles and Gifts)

July 24: Ecclesial Health (Prayer)

July 31: Spirit-Inspired Worship

There will be one last mark to be covered in August—that of Intentional Authentic Evangelism. By focusing on these seven marks, Park Presbyterian Church will continue to address the questions, “Who are We?” “Who is our Neighbor?” and “Who is God calling us to be?” This is all a part of the interim process and will help in discerning both Park’s continued presence and mission in Newark and aide in the choice of your next pastor.

The results from the Core Values Audit were interesting. First, only 14 people responded to the 25-question survey. Each question was rated on a scale of 1-4 with 4 being high and 1 being low. Those taking the audit were asked to think of what the core values were of the Park Presbyterian Church congregation not of their own personal core values. The two sets of core values may be different. Second, the results of those responses were as follows: the higher the percentage, the more 3 and 4's.

- Preaching and Teaching Scripture: Communicating God's Word to the people- 85%
- Family: People immediately related to one another by marriage or birth-50%
- Bible Knowledge: A familiarity with the truths of the Scriptures-58%
- World missions: Spreading the gospel of Christ around the globe-43%
- Community: Caring about and addressing the needs of others-93%
- Encouragement: Giving hope to people who need some hope-72%
- Giving: providing a portion of one's finances to support the ministry-64%
- Fellowship: Relating to and enjoying one another-86%
- Leadership: A person's ability to influence others to pursue God's mission for their church-70%
- Prayer: Communicating with God-86%
- Excellence: Maintaining the highest of ministry standards that bring glory to God-57%
- Evangelism: Telling others the good news about Christ-7%
- Cultural relevance: Communicating truth in a way that people who aren't like us understand it-35%
- Team ministry: A group of people ministering together-57%
- Creativity: Coming up with new ideas and ways of doing ministry-71%
- Worship: Attributing worth to God-100%
- Status quo: A preference for the way things are now-43%
- Cooperation: The act of working together in the service of the Savior-85%
- Lost people: People who are non-Christian and may not attend church (unchurched)-35%
- Mobilized laity: Christians who are actively serving in the ministries of the church-64%
- Tradition: The customary ways or the "tried and true"-57%
- Obedience: a willingness to do what God or others ask-57%
- Innovation: Making changes that promote the ministry as it serves Christ-42%
- Initiative: the willingness to take the first step or make the first move in a ministry situation-57%

What are Core Values and why do they matter?

Mark Frost with Interim Ministry Partners writes:

“Core values are deeply-held understandings and attitudes that guide a church in its planning and decision-making processes. They form the foundation on which members perform their work and conduct themselves. These values underlie the church's ministry efforts, govern members' interactions with each other, and guide the strategies that will be used to fulfill the church's mission. Core values describe the personality and character of a congregation.”

Core values provide a foundation which molds a congregation and its mission.

Every church is unique, even within a denomination. A church's geographic location, its demographics, the size of its active membership, its history, and particularly the people who have shaped the ministry of the church all help to form its personality and values.

Every church has core values whether they realize it or not. Because these core values form the foundation on which the congregation, its leaders, and its governing bodies make choices, it is better to identify and understand these shared values. There is a difference between personal core values and shared core values. Conflicts can arise when leadership in a church makes decisions based on personal rather than the shared core values of the congregation. Sometimes, a potential leader's giftedness and personal passions threaten a church's shared values and thus their sense of calling from God. At other times a potential leader's giftedness and personal passions enhance the church's shared values. Knowing what a church's shared core values are ensures that everyone is on the same footing when decisions are made because leaders and governing bodies can be held accountable to make decisions based on these shared values-not just on their own personal values.

The Core Values Survey

Tim Woodroof with Interim Ministry Partners writes:

“Churches can get caught between the **"rock" of their ideals and aspirations** and the **"hard place" of custom, comfort zones, and expectations**. This "between" spot makes churches vulnerable to confusion, paralysis, and conflict.”

Now, re-look at the core values generated from the survey.

How are they similar to your own core values? Are they different? What surprised you about the results?

We had a Property Committee meeting in May after an extended period of time with no meetings. We identified a series of short term and long term items that needed attention and started to outline how to address them. Some of the short term items have been addressed such as the replacement of the hot water tank in the lounge kitchenette, and the cleanup and trimming of the plantings. Our office copier lease was expiring and we looked at two vendors and selected a new proposal from Toshiba for a new copier that will be installed later this summer. In examining the old lease and how many copies we made per month, we found a way to adjust the budgeted numbers of copies in the lease which should save us money in the future. A big Thank You to Jamie Harris for all his work on keeping the outside of the building looking good and another Thank You to Kris Joslyn and the Boy Scout Venture Crew for working to distribute and rake 7 cubic yards of mulch around the building. We completed that task in about 1 ½ hours one evening with the help of the scouts and their parents. The building is being requested more frequently by outside groups in the community and we are pleased to share our facility to meet the needs of our neighbors.

Richard DeForrest Lunt: (Donna and Scott Blondell)

Richard DeForrest Lunt of Rochester died May 13 after a period of declining health and cognition. Born in New Haven, CT in 1933, he was predeceased by parents Herbert Arthur Lunt and Pearl Collins, brother Donald Lunt (Maria) and first wife Ruth P. Bainton. Richard is survived by his partner of 17 years, Carmel Merrill, her children and grandchildren, and godson Scott Leubner and children Emily and Elliot. Richard served in the military during the Korean War, earned his undergraduate from Oberlin and PhD in History from University of New Mexico. He enjoyed a rewarding career as a professor of American history at RIT and wrote two books on the American labor movement. His deepest delight throughout was connecting with students. A lifelong learner, Richard took up watercolor painting and storytelling in retirement and grew skilled at both. He exhibited locally and wrote and performed stories about his extended family at festivals and social gatherings. Richard became a Quaker and joined the Society of Friends at the Rochester Quaker Meetinghouse, where he met Carmel and where they celebrated their union with a commitment ceremony in 2005. Buddhism also enriched Richard's life and he and Carmel regularly participated in retreats organized by a local sangha. Richard was committed to racial justice and civil rights and believed there is "that of God" in every person. He acted on his convictions, visiting men in Attica prison, facilitating a wrongly sentenced inmate's release and continuing the relationship as father to son. He also supported numerous charities and connected personally with families in need. A man of gentle grace, humility, and acceptance even in the face of pain and suffering, Richard often said "life is not about me." That's the legacy he lived and the spirit he leaves us.

William "Bill" Guchone (Rosemary Guchone)

William Guchone, 69, died Saturday (June 4, 2022) in Saranac Lake. A funeral service for Bill will be 11 a.m, Saturday (Note July 16) at the Park Presbyterian Church, Maple Court, Newark. JOBS AT PARK

CHURCH ORGANIST:

The Church Organist provides organ and piano music for worship services and other church functions including weddings and funerals.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Support the church's worship environment through the well-prepared execution of music presented by the choir, bells, and other musicians for Sunday weekly services at 10am, such as hymns, prelude, postlude, and other music as necessary (Responses, Offertory, Communion, etc.)
- Rehearse with and accompany the adult channel choir prior to the service on Sunday mornings at 9:00am and during the 10am service.
- Provide appropriate music on organ and/or piano for "special" church services as needed, such as Thanksgiving Eve, Christmas Eve, Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday.
- Serve as accompanist for the Chancel Choir in regular and special rehearsals and performances as assigned.
- Plan, select, and prepare preludes, postludes and offertories, according to the needs of the worship services.
- Play for weddings and funerals, as requested (and upon availability), being permitted to receive additional compensation from the parties involved.
- Attend meetings Worship and Music Committee Meetings (by zoom if needed).

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

This is a part-time salaried position, reporting to the Pastor. The Church Organist is expected to perform on Sundays throughout the year, to include Christmas Day (if it falls on a Sunday), and Easter. The Church Organist qualifies as a regular employee for PTO (paid time off) benefits. Salary commensurate with experience. Minimum salary \$10,000

Hi! My name is Robbie!

I am 15 years old, a son, brother, student, racecar fan, and kid. Since my birth, I have been fighting bilateral kidney disease and a neurogenic bladder. These are big words that mean my kidneys are shutting down and my bladder doesn't work. My first surgery to reverse renal failure was when I was three weeks old.

Since then, I've had surgeries to numerous to count in an effort to slow the degenerative disease. In recent years, kidney infections have caused me to spend as much time in Golisano's Children's Hospital as I have at home. As you most likely would guess, my life has been limited by this disease. I am not able to participate in the many activities open to most boys my age, no sports or camp outs or roughhousing. That is not to say that I don't do what I can.

I love gaming, laughing with friends and family, and I try to make the world a better place.

One of my recent projects was raising funds through the church to help finance Mercy Ship, a floating hospital that travels the world providing free healthcare to those in need.

I have not entered stage four of this disease and I have been put on a list for a kidney transplant. I remain optimistic about the future, hoping that all who receive this message will pray to see if God is calling you to provide the gift of life.



Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**




