Ponderings from the Pastor

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. By now many have heard that the Pastor Nominating Committee decided not to call me as the pastor for Park Presbyterian Church. To make their continuing work easier, I have removed my name from consideration as a candidate for future ministry, and will instead soon answer a pastoral call at another church, in a different Presbytery.

To all those who remained involved with Park Church since I arrived at the tail end of 2013, let us acknowledge that we have been through a great deal together. It took great faith and no small amount of endurance to weather the storms of 2012 and 2013. As we discussed, God calls us to see through difficult processes in spiritual commitment to each other, and I highly praise all who were able to walk that difficult road. Your devotion brought your spiritual community to a better place. Today, Park Church is known in Newark and beyond as a people who actively serve and help others. The goal the congregation set in 2016 – to "shine Christ's light to the community" - is in many ways already realized. That is quite a change from the "house divided" of 2013, and the change was swift and organic, arising out of members' own spiritual inclinations.

This became possible because people started caring for each other inside the church first. Our time of historical remembering showed a trend towards acceptance of different views and less strict adherence to theological uniformity starting in the 1960s. That trend accelerated as we worked on reconciliation and new ministries. The warmth that was always here, always present among you, became more clearly expressed and more easily seen by others.

In the last two years, the Session has focused more intentionally upon leadership

befitting a 21st-century church. It has been a long conversation, but in the past several months old modes of

leadership have been gradually released by the entire Session, and discussions of the leadership skills and approaches that work effectively today are taking form. I am hopeful that God will continue this work long after I am gone, which should benefit the whole church. Collaborative, deliberative, intentional leadership does not seem to

be clearly defined among the whole church yet, and popularizing a shared understanding of leadership may take time simply because it is new.

As with all things, you do not continue that conversation – or the work that forming new leadership norms will entail - alone. Emmanuel, "God-with-us," walks beside you as that journey continues. Most of the healing that we accomplished together in our first two years

took place as people realized: God never "left the building," and most certainly never left the people who actually comprise Park Presbyterian Church. God was here, and is here, and will remain here, for hundreds of years

to come - "lo, even unto the close of the age" (Matt. 28:20). God sets a standard of servant-leadership in Christ that illuminates the path ahead. So in the end, the "work" involved is less about what you do, and all about how you follow God. Since you have already proven your ability to do this during times of strain and discontent, you will no

doubt bring this next good step, in a more comfortable context, into fruition. And may you be blessed in the

doing.



More On Leadership

Collaborative leader-

ship is all about inclu-

sion; and we are meant

to include others because

Collaborative leadership can take several forms, but it may be most helpful to view this form of church service as an "outlook" or an "approach to church" rather than specific actions. As collaborative norms take hold, there is often an acceleration of change toward inclusion that makes the change itself self-perpetuating. One of the chief advantages of collaborative approaches is

the way more and more people become drawn to the matter at hand, sometimes resulting in a need to create new roles just so those who want to be involved can take part. We have seen that happen here and there; odds are that trend will continue and grow.

The change also accelerates because there can be initial obstacles to overcome. A common one is past lack of collaboration means leaders are accustomed to working with minimal input from others, so the infrastructure for change may not be in place (that is, lack of collaboration creates broken links that make it difficult to initiate collaboration). The common solution to this issue is repeated, consistent use of inclusive approaches, which in churches means things like open announcements of meeting times, notifications of events to all interested (including those who rarely, if ever, show up) and personal invitations to take part. It's important that people persist in these practices, since it takes time for new practices to take hold.

A particular tendency that still pops up at Park Church is to agree in principle to collaborative leadership, but then select leaders who are widely known to be exclusionary anyway, simply because "I like them." Obviously, church leadership should never be a popularity contest nor a way to get our friends in the door. Fortunately, Presbyterian structure provides a way to counter this habit: congregational meetings. It can be a sign of

health when church members ask questions about nominees put forward and offer nominees from the floor; it may be a sign of something unhealthy when those who don't exhibit servant leadership are elected just to "avoid confrontation." When a faith community is moving away from standards that don't work and towards standards like Christian integrity, truthfulness,

and inclusion, discussing specific nominees can help move the whole church forward. In this way, we see that the definition of Christian Leadership depends upon the whole membership, not the Nominating Committee. In the end, asserting that someone is not a good fit for a position such as Elder is not an insult to a mature Christian, but an ac-

ceptance of the truth that each member is responsible for the spiritual direction of Park Presbyterian Church, and that responsibility often comes to the fore during congregational meetings.

I will be praying that Park Presbyterian Church continues to explore the specific form of collaborative leadership people will find effective and helpful. Today, that is a critical value for involving young families, as younger adults were introduced to collaborative learning starting in elementary school. But more importantly, God leads the way to these leadership values that honor our Lord. When we didn't want to work together with God, God came to us as Jesus. And when we failed to follow or understand Who Jesus was and what He means to us, Jesus took up the Cross, and then rose again, forever imprinting within us the meaning of God's love. Collaborative leadership is all about inclusion; and we are meant to include others because God first included us.

A Monthly Devotion

IS YOUR ABILITY TO SEE GOD BLINDED?

"Lift up your eyes on high, and see who has created these things..."

ISAIAH 40:26

The people of God in Isaiah's time had blinded their minds' ability to see God by looking on the face of idols. But Isaiah made them look up at the heavens; that is, he made them begin to use their power to think and to visualize correctly. If we are children of God, we have a tremendous treasure in nature and will realize that it is holy and sacred. We will see God reaching out to us in every wind that blows, every sunrise and sunset, every cloud in the sky, every flower that blooms, and every leaf that fades, if we will only begin to use our blinded thinking to visualize it.

The real test of spiritual focus is being able to bring your mind and thoughts under control. Is your mind focused on the face of an idol? Is the idol yourself? Is it your work? Is it your idea of what a servant should be, or maybe your experience of salvation and sanctification? If so, then your ability to see God is blinded. You will be powerless when faced with difficulties and will be forced to endure in darkness. If your power to

see has been blinded, don't look back on your own experiences, but look to God. It is God you need. Go beyond yourself and away from the faces of your idols and away from everything else that has been blinding your thinking. Wake up and accept the ridicule that Isaiah gave to his people, and deliberately turn your thoughts and your eyes to God.

One of the reasons for our sense of futility in prayer is that we have lost our power to visualize. We can no longer even imagine putting ourselves deliberately before God. It is actually more important to be broken bread and poured-out wine in the area of intercession than in our personal contact with others. The power of visualization is what God gives a saint so that he can go beyond himself and be firmly placed into relationships he never before experienced.

Scouting at Park Church

The Scouting program at Park Presbyterian Church is more than just an activity for our youth to learn about the outdoors.

Scouting provides fun, fellowship, and hands-on training to youth members of our congregation as well as youth in our community. It is a year-round program pursuing the three specific aims of 1) character development, 2) citizenship training, and 3) personal fitness.

A fundamental tenet of Scouting is centered on God and is found in the organization's Declaration of Religious Principle. The national bylaws state:

"The Boy Scouts of America maintains that no member can grow into the best kind of citizen without recognizing an obligation to God."

From the Scout Oath and Scout Law to the individual Duty to God requirements at each stage of advancement through the Scouting program, youth and their families are presented a framework for life that first stands before God, and then works on how to live in a way that honors God's blessings and serves others.

One Great Hour of Sharing

HAVE YOU EVER taught a child to fold their fingers inside their hands and say the rhyme, "here is the church, here is the steeple, open the doors and see all the people?" The wiggling fingers teach children, and adults, too, that the church is not the building, the steeples, windows, or structure, but the people gathering to worship God.

There's something else in the children's rhyme. As the child breaks open their hands to reveal the people, they move their fingers back and forth, often as fast as they can. This simple move reminds us that the church is the energy and actions that share the love of Christ.

When a disaster strikes, people give, volunteer, and pray so that those impacted receive help and hope, THIS IS CHURCH.

When poverty and violence cause hunger and people join together to respond to the need and address its root causes, THIS IS CHURCH.
