



THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant God be with you. *People* And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

God of all power and might, the author and giver of all good things: Graft in our hearts the love of your Name; increase in us true religion; nourish us with all goodness; and bring forth in us the fruit of good works; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A READING FROM THE HEBREW BIBLE | Song of Solomon 2:8-13 (NRSVUE) The people sit.

The voice of my beloved! Look, he comes, leaping upon the mountains, bounding over the hills.

⁹ My beloved is like a gazelle or a young stag. Look, there he stands behind our wall, gazing in at the windows, looking through the lattice. ¹⁰ My beloved speaks and says to me: "Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away, ¹¹ for now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone. ¹²The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land. ¹³The fig tree puts forth its figs, and the vines are in blossom; they give forth fragrance. Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away.

PSALM 45: 1-2, 7-10 (Book of Common Prayer)

Remain seated. The Psalm is said responsively.

My heart is stirring with a noble song; let me recite what I have fashioned for the king; * my tongue shall be the pen of a skilled writer.

You are the fairest of men; * grace flows from your lips, because God has blessed you for ever.

Your throne, O God, endures for ever and ever, * a scepter of righteousness is the scepter of your kingdom; you love righteousness and hate iniquity.

Therefore God, your God, has anointed you * with the oil of gladness above your fellows.

All your garments are fragrant with myrrh, aloes, and cassia, * and the music of strings from ivory palaces makes you glad.

Kings' daughters stand among the ladies of the court; * on your right hand is the queen, adorned with the gold of Ophir.

THE EPISTLE | James 1:17-27 (NRSVUE)

Remain seated.

¹⁷ Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. ¹⁸ In fulfillment of his own purpose he gave birth to us by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.

¹⁹You must understand this, my beloved brothers and sisters: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger, ²⁰ for human anger does not produce God's righteousness. ²¹Therefore rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls.


²²But be doers of the word and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. ²³ For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; ²⁴ for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. ²⁵ But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing.

²⁶ If any think they are religious and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. ²⁷ Religion that is pure and undefiled before God the Father is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

THE HOLY GOSPEL | Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23 (NRSVUE) Remain standing, as able.

The Holy Gospel of our Savior, Jesus Christ, according to Mark. Glory to you, O Christ.

7 Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, ² they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. ³ (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders, ⁴ and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash, and there are also many other traditions that they observe: the washing of cups and pots and bronze kettles and beds. ⁵ So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not walk according to the tradition of the elders but eat with defiled hands?" ⁶ He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me;

The Gospel of our Savior.

Praise to you, O Christ.

⁷ in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.'

^{8 &}quot;You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition."

¹⁴Then he called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: ¹⁵ there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile."

²¹ For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: sexual immorality, theft, murder, ²² adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, debauchery, envy, slander, pride, folly. ²³ All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."

THE SERMON | The Rev. Dr. Janet Waggoner

A STATEMENT OF FAITH BASED ON GALATIANS 3:26-28

All stand, as able.

Celebrant Let us renew our pledge to work for unity, justice, and peace.

People We are all children of God.

There is no longer Jew or Greek.

There is no longer slave or free.

There is no longer male and female.

For we are all one.

We believe Jesus lived for this and died for this.

We pledge ourselves with God's help and the support of each other to make this become a reality.

THE NICENE CREED

All remain standing, as able.

We believe in one God,

the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth,

of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God,

begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven:

was incarnate by the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary,

and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

All stand, or kneel, as able. The Deacon, if present, bids the prayers.

The oil of gladness seals our hearts in the love of God, in whose Name we offer our prayers, responding to each petition by saying, "Savior, be with us."

Enliven us with the desire to reach out to your world, engaging in the work of your word through our ministry with the poor, the unemployed, the orphan and widow, the lonely and bereaved, and all who seek the gift of hope; let us pray. **Savior, be with us.**

Inspire our Church to proclaim the Christian faith beyond its buildings and institutions, so that a new generation may come to know and love the power of Christ and the life-giving energy of the Holy Spirit; let us pray. **Savior, be with us.**

Save us from the false promises of this age, from its consumerism and false images of sexuality, from its idols of wealth and illusions of self-sufficiency, that our vision may be inspired by the life and witness of the saints, and those in our own time who are models of gospel faithfulness; let us pray. Savior, be with us.

Encourage those returning to schools and colleges to have a lively curiosity, a compassionate heart, and a vision of the world that leads to the restoration of its glory; let us pray. **Savior, be with us.**

Bring peace between the nations of the world, especially in ______, and wherever anger and resentment leads to destruction and the loss of life; let us pray. **Savior, be with us.**

Comfort those who have died as innocent victims of war, that they may inherit that kingdom where there is no death, neither sorrow nor crying, but the fullness of joy with all your saints; let us pray. Savior, be with us.

In the sure and certain hope of the resurrection of the dead, let us continue our prayers.

In the Anglican Cycle of Prayer, we pray this week for Igreja Anglicana de Mocambique e Angola.

In our Diocesan Cycle of Prayer, we pray this week for Underhill House, Seattle; Center for Spiritual Development; St. James Family Center, Cathlamet.

We pray for all those on our parish prayer list, and for those we name now, either silently or aloud.

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect.

Jesus Christ, you said to your apostles, "Peace I give to you; my own peace I leave with you:" Regard not our sins, but the faith of your Church, and give to us the peace and unity of that heavenly City, where with the Almighty and the Holy Spirit, you live and reign, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE CONFESSION

The Deacon, if present, bids the confession.

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Minister and People

Most merciful God,

we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart; We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The priest says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

THE PEACE

All stand, as able.

The peace of Christ be always with you.

And also with you.

Then the Ministers and the People may greet one another in the name of Christ.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND THANKSGIVINGS

Please be seated for the announcements and thanksgivings.

BIRTHDAY PRAYER

Watch over your *child/children*, O God, as their days increase; bless and guide them wherever they may be. Strengthen them when they stand; comfort them when discouraged or sorrowful; raise them up if they fall; and in their heart may your peace which passes understanding abide all the days of their life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

ANNIVERSARY PRAYER

O God, you have so consecrated the covenant of marriage that in it is represented the spiritual unity between Christ and his Church: Send therefore your blessing upon these your servants, that they may continue to so love, honor, and cherish each other in faithfulness and patience, in wisdom and true godliness, that their home may continue to be a haven of blessing and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

THE INVITATION

This is the table, not of the church but of Jesus Christ. It is made ready for those who love Jesus and who want to love him more. Come, you who have much faith and you who have little; you who have been here often and you who have not been for a long time or ever before. Come, you who have tried to follow and you who have failed. Come, not because the Church invites you; it is Christ, and he invites you to meet him here. (From the Iona Community, adapted)

All are invited and encouraged to come forward to receive communion or a blessing. To receive the bread, extend your hands and a piece of bread will be placed in your palm. (Gluten-free bread is available. Just say, "gluten-free".) To receive the wine, help the chalice bearer guide the chalice to

your lips and sip. To maintain health and safety, we ask that bread not be dipped into the chalice. To receive a blessing, please cross your arms across your chest, and the priest will bless you.





We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days, you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. Through Mary's Holy Child, you have delivered us from evil and made us worthy to stand before you. You have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life. *

At the following words concerning the bread, the Presider is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.



Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, gather all things into the circle of Christ's love, and bring us to that heavenly country where with the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. John, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of all your children; through Jesus Christ, * the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Most Blessed One, now and forever.

People We, who are many, are one body, for we all share in the one bread, one cup.




PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION


