Happy Birthday to the Church!! Advent is the beginning of the Church Year!! The color in the Church is now Blue. I love our blue hangings, the color is so rich, but not cold. So what is Advent, besides the beginning? To some, it heralds the beginning of the frantic shopping season, starting with Black Friday – but not for us. For us, it heralds the time of waiting, for the birth of Jesus.

I found this following prayer online and thought I would share it with you to use when lighting your first candle on your Advent Wreath:

### First Sunday of Advent

Leader: "Today we light the first candle of the Advent wreath. Each candle has a meaning. This first candle is HOPE." (The candle is lit.)

Scripture: "Psalm 33:20 – We wait in hope for the LORD; he is our help and our shield.

Prayer said by all: "Eternal God, as we await the coming of our savior, give us the courage to hope. Give us grace to see your plans of redemption for our lives, for this community, and for the world. Through Jesus Christ, the source of our redemption and hope. Amen."

### Second Sunday of Advent

Leader: "Today we light the first and second candles of the Advent wreath. Each candle has a meaning.

The first candle is HOPE, the second candle is PEACE." (The candles are lit.)

Scripture: "Colossians 3:15 – Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace."

Prayer said by all: "Almighty God, you offer rest for our hearts, and peace for our souls. Give us grace to seek peace in our lives, peace in this community, and peace in the world. Through Jesus Christ, the prince of peace. Amen."

### Third Sunday of Advent

Leader: "Today we light the first, second, and third candles of the Advent wreath. Each candle has a meaning. The first candle is HOPE, the second candle is PEACE, and the third candle is JOY." (The candles are lit.)

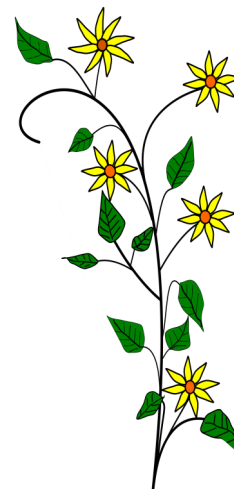

## About St. Paul's

The earliest record of Episcopal Church services in this vicinity was 1816 when St. Stephen's Church of Perryville was incorporated. At that time Chittenango was little more than a gathering of frame and log houses. From 1816-1832 rectors from St. Stephen's held missionary services in Chittenango.

Around 1849 a few gentlemen who greatly admired and revered the beautiful services of the Church, agreed to make an effort to have services occasionally held. By the spring of 1855 services began to be held regularly once a month in the Bethel. St. Paul's was officially organized as a parish on June 18, 1855. St. Paul's church was built in 1865 as a Gothic Revival-style structure. The lot, building, furniture and windows cost \$5000. The building was completed in less than six months. The first service was held in the church on Easter Day, April 1, 1866.

On May 12, 1866 the church was consecrated by Bishop Coxe. It was added to the U.S. National Historic Register of National Places in 1996.

**Fourth Sunday of Advent**

Leader: "Today we light the first, second, third, and fourth candles of the Advent wreath. Each candle has a meaning. The first candle is HOPE, the second candle is PEACE, the third candle is JOY, and the fourth candle is LOVE." (The candles are lit.)

Scripture: "John 13:34 – Jesus said to them, I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Prayer said by all: "Loving God, your mercy and compassion endure forever. Open our hearts, that we may receive your love; and following the example of your Son, spread that love to a love-starved world. Through Jesus Christ, who loved us to the end. Amen."

**Christmas Eve and Christmas Season (optional)**

Leader: "Today we light all the candles of the Advent wreath. Each candle has a meaning. The first candle is HOPE, the second candle is PEACE, the third candle is JOY, and the fourth candle is LOVE. The center candle is the Christ candle." (The candles are lit.)

Scripture: "Isaiah 9:6 – For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

Prayer said by all: "O God of hope, peace, joy, and love. As Mary and Joseph welcomed you into the world, now help us welcome you into our lives. Give us courage to hope; strength to seek peace. Fill our spirits with joy; and our hearts with love. Through Jesus Christ, the Lord of all. Amen." (Credit given to The Rev. Matthew Kozlowski)

May the peace and joy of the blessed season, follow you all through the days and night. May you find time to contemplate the meaning of Christmas, even as you deal with the hustle and bustle of the commercial part of the season. 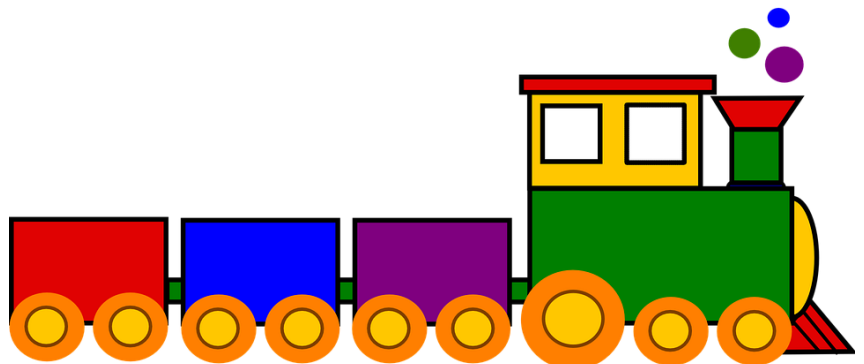
Toys and other items are being collected for children ages birth to 18 years for both boys and girls.
